

Objective Drought Resiliency Projects

- Help communities prepare for and respond to drought and other water scarcity situations
 - Increasing the reliability of water supplies
 - Improving water management
 - Providing benefits to fish and wildlife



Drought Resiliency Projects Output Drought Resiliency Projects

Eligible Project Types

Tasks A-C

- Infrastructure Improvements
- New conveyance system components
- Additional water storage
- Recharge facilities
- Capture and treat alternative supplies
- Decision Support Tools & Modeling

Funding

- Non-Federal Cost Share: 50% or greater.
- Funding Level I: \$750k (completed within 2 years)
- Funding Level II: \$3 million (completed within 3 years)

Task D

 Domestic Water Supply Projects for Tribes or disadvantaged communities that <u>do not currently</u> have reliable water supplies

Funding

- 5% non-Federal cost share (can request waiver)
- No cost share required for Guam, U.S. Virgin Islands, American Samoa, or Northern Mariana Islands.
- Up to \$10 million in Federal funds and must be completed within 3 years. Must not exceed \$10 million in total project costs.



Drought Resiliency Projects Applicant Eligibility

Eligible Applicants

Category A:

- States, Tribes, irrigation districts, and water districts;
- State, regional, or local authorities, whose members include one or more organizations with water or power delivery authority; and
- Other organizations with water or power delivery authority.

Category A applicants must be located in Alaska, Arizona, California, Colorado, Hawaii, Idaho, Kansas, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, New Mexico, North Dakota, Oklahoma, Oregon, South Dakota, Texas, Utah, Washington, Wyoming, American Samoa, Guam, the Northern Mariana Islands, the Virgin Islands, or Puerto Rico.

Category B:


- Nonprofit <u>conservation</u> organizations that are acting in partnership with the agreement of an entity described in Category A.
- Category B applicants must include with their application a letter from the Category A partner, stating they are acting in partnership with the applicant and agree to the submittal and content of the proposal.

Category B applicants must be located in the United States or a territory listed above.

Note: Alaska, Hawaii, and Puerto Rico are not eligible to apply for Task D.



Evaluation Criteria





Evaluation Criteria

Criterion A – Severity of Drought or Water Scarcity Conditions and Impacts (15 points)

- Severity of Current or Potential Impacts in the project area, such as:
 - Public health, environmental, economic, and any conflicts over limited water resources
 - Impacts to specific sectors (e.g., impacts to agriculture, environmental, recreation, tourism, forestry, hydropower) if no action is taken.
- How will the project address or mediate these impacts?

Criterion B – Project Benefits (30 points)

- How does your project build long-term resilience to drought?
- How will the project help buffer against water shortages, reduce the need for emergency responses, and enhance the resilience of water systems?
- Quantitative and Qualitative description
- Provide detailed support for benefits
- Any planned, direct ecological or climate change benefits.



*Additional information required for well projects

Evaluation Criteria

Criterion C – Planning and Preparedness (15 points)

- Is the project or goal of the project supported by any existing planning efforts?
- Explain the plan process, collaborative stakeholder involvement
- Is the project specifically identified in a plan and is it prioritized?
- A Drought-specific plan is not required but plans that contain drought elements (e.g. a system for monitoring drought, drought projections that consider climate change, vulnerability assessments, identification of drought mitigation projects, drought response actions, and an operational and administrative framework) will improve the score.

*Provide only the relevant sections of the plan to support your answers.

Criterion D – Readiness to Proceed and Project Implementation (15 points)

- Detailed, thorough schedule and major milestones
- Identification of necessary permits and regulatory compliance, including consideration for compliance costs
- Engineering and design work



Evaluation Criteria

Criterion E – Presidential and DOI Priorities (15 points)

- Disadvantaged/Underserved communities, including insular areas
- Tribal benefits
- Use the CEJST (Climate and Economic Justice Screening Tool) when addressing this criteria.

Criterion G – Stakeholder Support (5 points)

- Any in-kind contributions from stakeholders
- Letters of support for the project
- Unique letters will score better than the same template language for all letters of support.

Criterion F – Nexus to Reclamation (5 points)

- Relation to Reclamation project or activity
- Does NOT include prior Reclamation grants.



Program Requirements Summary

Eligible Applicants States, Tribes, insular areas, irrigation districts, and water districts; State, regional, or local authorities, whose members include one or more organizations with water or power delivery authority; other organizations with water or power delivery authority; or a nonprofit conservation organization partnering with a previously described entity.

Funding Groups

FG I: Up to \$750,000 in Federal funds for projects completed within 2 years FG II: Up to \$3,000,000 in Federal funds for projects completed within 3 years Task D: Up to \$10,000,000 in Federal funds for projects completed within 3 years

Cost Share

50% non-Federal cost share required for Task A-C projects 5% non-Federal cost share for Task D projects (can request waiver)

Evaluation Criteria

Applications will be evaluated against the evaluation criteria which comprise a total of 100 points.



Sample schedule







You may be asked to provide:

- Additional budget clarifications
- Cost-share documentation
- Explanation of requested pre-award costs
- All reports up to date on other Reclamation awards







General Considerations

- The most successful projects are those that fit well with the Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO). Review the objective of the NOFO, the eligible project types, ineligible project types, and the evaluation criteria carefully.
- Important: Read everything in the NOFO!
 - Contact the Program Coordinator to discuss any questions about your project fit or applicant eligibility, or about the funding opportunity.
- Give yourself plenty of time to write and submit the proposal.
- Do not assume the Application Review Committee knows you!
 - Paint the reviewers a picture and back it up with data.
 - Committee is comprised of Reclamation staff from throughout the Western states.
- If your application is not awarded, request a debriefing to help prepare a better proposal next year.

Evaluation Criteria

- Make sure you respond to every criterion and every relevant sub-criterion
- Your responses should:
 - We recommend you copy and paste the criteria directly into your proposal and place your response immediately below each criterion/sub-criterion.
 - Provide support in the form of quantification or citations to any supporting attached documents.
 - Make the case for how your project meets the criterion. General statements without explanation or support will not score well.
 - If any sub-questions do not pertain to your project (i.e. green infrastructure) you may leave out the question entirely so you may be more detailed elsewhere.
- <u>Application Tip:</u> Well-supported responses to the evaluation criteria are the key to writing a competitive proposal.



Environmental and Cultural Resource Compliance

- All projects funded through this opportunity must comply with Federal environmental and cultural resources laws and regulations. Reclamation regional and area office staff will ensure compliance. This compliance must occur prior to any ground-disturbing activities taking place.
 - Note: Reclamation is required to perform its own environmental assessment, so include this assessment in your proposal's project timeline. A categorical exclusion can be obtained after notice of award.
- Project scope and budget should align! Reviewers will consider whether the budget is reasonable to complete the scope described in the technical project description.
- Consider inflation when developing your budget.





- STRONGLY Recommend using Attachment A-Budget Narrative Guidance & Attachment B-Budget Detail
 - ❖ No required format, but required information listed in the NOFO must be included
- Application Tip: Write budget narrative while preparing the budget estimate

6a. Personnel

This category includes salaries and wages of employees of the applicant organization that will be working directly on the project. Generally, salaries of administrative and/or clerical personnel are classified as indirect or overhead costs in your organization's accounting system included as a portion of the stated indirect costs. If these salaries can be adequately documented as direct costs, they can be included in this section; however, a justification must be included in the narrative. Recommend reviewing § 200.430 Compensation - personal services for more information on the specific requirements regarding compensation costs, including the Standards for Documentation of Personnel Expenses at §200.430(I).

Narrative: For key personnel such as the project manager or principal investigator, identify the name individual and position/title. Other personnel should be identified by position only. For all positions, identify the project tasks that will be performed. Compensation rates can be expressed as hourly rates and number of hours or annual salary and percentage effort that will be contributed to each task, but must be consistent with your organization's accounting and timekeeping policies. Include estimated hours for compliance with reporting requirements, including the final project report and evaluation. For multi-year project, identify the level of effort anticipated for each budget year and any estimates increases in compensation rates. Within the budget narrative, provide a certification that the labor rates included in the budget proposal represent the actual labor rates of the identified personnel/positions and are consistently applied to Federal and non-Federal activities. Note: The annual/hourly labor rate must not include fringe benefits.






